Vlogging About Discourse Communities Due Date: Weight:

Purpose:

Writing is something that we do every day, whether it's through text message, in an email, on social media, in a class, or on a job. The kinds of writing that we do in each of these scenarios often depend on the discourse community we are part of. In other words, we subconsciously understand the language we should use, the style of writing that is appropriate, and the correct formatting for the text for each of the scenarios we find ourselves in. We had to learn these "rules" for each of the discourse communities we belong to. Sometimes we find ourselves in unfamiliar discourse communities--for example, an advanced science class--and it can be tricky to understand the customs of that community.

This assignment asks you to examine a discourse community you belong to or are interested in and asks you to look closely at the different kinds of writing that exists within that community. The goal of this assignment is to help you become more aware of the rhetorical situation and the culture of a specific community. As you gain greater awareness of the language practices within a specific community, you can make informed choices based on this knowledge, and you will be on the path to becoming a more rhetorically aware and flexible writer.

Task:

For this assignment, you will make a personal video detailing, explaining, and/or examining a specific discourse community. As when writing a traditional paper, you will go through a thorough writing process that includes brainstorming, pre-writing, drafting and revision. For example, you will submit a storyboard ahead of time, and you'll also submit smaller clips of your video ahead of time as part of the peer review process.

In this video, you will need to directly feature 3-4 specific instances of writing/discourse that occurs within that community. You will then analyze these instances of discourse and discuss what we can learn about the community and its use of language by looking at these examples.

The following questions can guide your discussion:

- Are there certain genres frequently used by this community?
- What are their genre characteristics?
- Are there certain terminology, abbreviations, slang, etc. that is common to this community and/or that someone who is not in this community might not understand?
- Are there expectations in regard to tone and style or multilingualism?
- Are there methods of communication (specific texts, specific places you communicate, or ways of communicating) that are unique to this community?

These questions are meant to help you brainstorm, but there are certainly other elements you could consider.

The final product can be created using a phone, gopro, or other device. You can then use YouTube's built in editor, Microsoft Movie Maker, or Apple's iMovie to edit and upload it to a video host (YouTube or Vimeo).

Criteria for Success:

All videos produced should contain the following elements:

- Length: About 6 minutes (10%)
- Multimedia: Use music/text for effective transitions (10%)
- Editing: Final polished and edited project (check sound levels, transitions, professionalism) (10%)
- Dynamism: Contains lots of movement, not just speaking to a camera
- Content: Reference a specific discourse community, directly feature 3-4 examples of written discourse from that community in your video, analyze these instances of discourse, and discuss what we can learn about the community and its use of language by looking at these examples (60%)
